PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Our June Board of Directors meeting was held in person at the HOA clubhouse. This was the first meeting in over two years that was held in person. We are committed to returning to in-person meetings; and based on the size of our clubhouse, and the amount of open space, we feel that we can offer a safe, comfortable environment for in-person meetings. We will continue to try to support those who cannot attend in person by offering a Zoom alternative. In addition, we will be looking at cost-effective options to improve on this hybrid meeting capability, as we have board members who are frequently remote.

In April, the new clubhouse double doors were installed. We are now waiting on the final pieces to complete the security and card key access system. We will run a trial period of this access system on the clubhouse, with the hope of also converting the pool and tennis court access to a card key system later this year.

During the first week of June, the new solar power system was installed on the clubhouse roof. This system will provide our HOA with approximately 85 percent of our power needs. We chose to put in the largest system possible without expanding our 200 amp service feed from PG&E. The system is currently operational, and we will be allowed to sell excess power back to PG&E in July. This will then offset our electricity charges for the pool, irrigation, and lights within our community.

I would like to thank David O'Rouke for his diligent efforts in this project, including the initial analysis to help the board with the final decision as well as his guidance and involvement with the physical installation of the system. Our community is lucky to have a key volunteer like David. As an aside, if any-



SCIENCE

FIVE PLANETS LINE UP IN RARE DISPLAY

You will want to find the least obstructed view as Mercury will be very low in the sky. This may be difficult given our west coast location.

June brings us a rare planetary alignment (or "planetary conjunction"). You can expect to see Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn all in the same part of the early morning sky this month. Optimum viewing time will be approximately 4:30 am (or 45 minutes before sunrise) on June 24. You do not need binoculars, just your eyes!


June 25 - FREE Woodies on the Wharf

Look for these in the grocery store

Nestle Toll House Ready-to Bake Brownies come in an oven-safe pan, so it's easy to whip up a batch in no time.

Local eggs and a show

The Glaum family of egg ranchers is in its fourth generation and dates back to 1922 when John H. Glaum built a chicken house in Nebraska. He moved the family to Santa Cruz County in 1946. Their Watsonville chicken farm cares for 120,000 cage-free* chickens. Now, that's a lot of chickens!

Their barn store and processing room are located in Aptos. Here you can put \$4 (four \$1 bills--no coins) into a **vending machine and watch a dancing chicken show** at the same time. (Dancing chickens are often specially costumed for holidays.) These facilities are



located at: 3100 Valencia Road, Aptos. Open Monday-Friday: 8 am - 4 pm and Saturday: 8 am - 2 pm.

*Glaum promises that its hens roam around freely and are fed an all-natural diet that does not contain any hormones, antibiotics, steroids, animal by-products, or recycled or processed foods. These hens will always: have fresh, pure water whenever they want it; eat nutritious and organic quality feed; be free of antibiotics or growth hormones; and live in clean, spacious, and well-ventilated barns.

California, was sold on June 7 to Atlas Holdings, a Connecticut private-equity firm. The



iconic West Coast poultry business ends 83 years of family ownership. Livingston Mayor Juan Aguilar, who was given a heads up before the sale,

told residents they should expect business to continue as usual. The new owner will keep the Foster Farms brand. Donnie Smith, former CEO at industry giant Tyson Foods, will assume the CEO role at Foster Farms.

COFFEE CONSUMPTION LINKED TO LOWER MORTALITY

A new study finds that drinking 1.5 to 3.5 cups of coffee--caffeinated or

decaffeinated--per day reduces one's risk of death by up to 30 percent.

To draw this conclusion, researchers analyzed data collected from over



170,000 people in the UK between the ages of 37 and 73 over a median seven-year period. Data analyzed included coffee consumption, demographic, lifestyle, and dietary information.


AND NOW, A MESSAGE FROM STARBUCKS:
