# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we wind down 2021, there are a number of items underway that will most likely span the fall and winter months. Earlier this year, in previous newsletters, I mentioned the issues with the failing retaining wall inside of our sewage treatment plant. When the board began investigation into the repair or replacement of the failing wall, we quickly discovered that it made the most sense for our HOA to look into the work required, as the plant was built in the 1986-88 time period, and all work was done by the HOA development contractors. There was some question as to whether the county could do it, but this was not a timely option.

Please follow all rules posted inside the pool area. By way of background, our treatment plant is within an area referenced by the county as CSA 5 (County Service Area 5). There are two treatment plants within CSA 5--one for CDS, and the other for the Sand Dollar Beach community. The operation of each of these facilities is paid for by the associated HOA in owners' annual property taxes. A general description of how our CSA operates can be found here on the county website:

Earlier this year we began speaking with outside contractors about obtaining bids for repair or replacements. It was determined that repair was not a feasible option given the fact that a major portion of the wall is failing. After reviewing a few options, we have found a vendor that will construct a replacement wall that will use a steel post structure and wood. We are currently beginning the permitting process by having the necessary design detail work done by outside engineering firms. We do not have enough information to place a final cost number to this project; however, we anticipate the project to be significantly less than the original dollars being discussed, which was in excess of \$100K for the project. The good news is that we currently believe this project can be absorbed by our reserve and a membership assessment should not be required.

The board is also beginning the budget process for 2022 at this time. There will be a new area on our website dedicated to

working drafts and associated budget documents; this will be found under the "Documents" tab. Please let me know if you need additional information, and I will do my best to assist you.

And they say second marriages don't last




Marilyn and Joe Nussbaum then (top right), and now (above).



# ON THE SHELF





## **NETFLIX**

**Nailed It!** It's the perfect baking show for those who don't have a clue how to bake. Like Pinterest fails come to life, home bakers who aren't very good at the craft compete against one another to create elaborate baked goods and sculptures. Described as "part reality contest, part hot mess," fans love watching the aspiring cooks fail miserably. The big reveal of their creations, in the end, will have you laughing hysterically, and not feeling so bad about that time the birthday cake you tried to make didn't turn out as you had hoped. Season 6 is streaming now.



**Sex Education.** The third season of this popular British comedy-drama about students, their parents, and staff from a fictional high school dealing with the topic of sexual intimacy is now streaming. With a star-studded cast that includes Gillian Anderson and Asa Butterfield, the central character is Otis (Butterfield), a young man just coming of age and dealing with the uncomfortable situation of having a promiscuous mother (Anderson) who works as a sex therapist. The first two seasons have received rave reviews, with critics calling it "a raucous romp through a group of teenagers whose sexual misadventures are so thoughtfully rendered, adults could learn a thing or two from them."

**On the Verge** is a new series created by Julie Delpy. This 12-episode series is a smart and funny portrait of four women. Set two months before the pandemic outbreak, the show follows four friends living in Los Angeles, all middle-aged women: Justine, Anne, Ell and Yasmin (played by Julie Delpy, Elisabeth Shue, Alexia Landeau and Sarah Jones). The series dives into their lives, and how their friendships help them grapple with their marital conflicts, raising their children, and their professional careers. Full of unapologetic wit and humor, *On the Verge* is a lighthearted comedy with great performances. With its 30-minute-long episodes, the series is an easy-to-binge comedy, that works more like an elongated movie than a series. There are no big twists, no major conflict, no cliffhangers punctuating each episode to entice viewers to watch the next. Instead, the series focuses on the portrayal of these four characters and their relationship, making it largely dependent on whether these characters are relatable and intriguing enough for viewers to continue to the next episode.


### **HBO MAX**

**Scenes from a Marriage.** Oscar Isaac and Jessica Chastain play the leads in this limited series about a divorced couple trying to navigate their fractured relationship over a 10-year period. Adapted from the Swedish 1973 miniseries by Ingmar Bergman, who wrote the story based on his own experiences, it's one of those shows that might hit close to home for some and elicit a tear or two. It's the acting, most early critics say, that truly makes this series an emotional masterpiece worth watching.

**Walker.** This CW series, a reboot of *Walker, Texas Ranger*, is about a Texas ranger named Cordell Walker (Jared Padalecki) who buries himself in a year-long undercover assignment as a way to deal with the murder of his wife. Once he returns, however, he faces his biggest challenge yet in reconnecting with his family, including his two children. While critics have not been kind to the first season thus far, fans have seemingly enjoyed it. The show has already been renewed for a second season.

**Cry Macho** (streaming through October 17; also in theaters). Directed by and starring Clint Eastwood, *Cry Macho* follows the story of a one-time rodeo star who takes a job escorting a boy from rural Mexico back to his Texas home. The unlikely pair faces an unexpectedly challenging journey, during which the world-weary horseman finds his own sense of redemption through teaching the boy what it means to be a good man.

# WHAT'S IN A WORD?



#### **Port and Starboard**

If you're a boater, you easily know these terms. Most of us are familiar with them, but often they still confuse us. Why not simply use "left" and "right"?

The words *port* and *starboard* have been used in the maritime industry for centuries and for very practical reasons. The words *left* and *right* are subjective and dependent upon each sailor's own point of view. To avoid confusion, the nautical terms *Port* and *Starboard* were adopted. *Port* side is the left-hand side of a ship when facing toward the front or bow of the ship, while *Starboard* is the right-hand side of the ship. These are fixed locations of a ship, and these terms are used to avoid any confusion.

#### Origins of "Port" and "Starboard" on Ships

It's interesting to know that the origin of the word *Starboard* comes from the Old English words "Steor" and "Bord." Most sailors were right handed, and the right side was the steering side, which later became *Starboard*. The left side was the loading side, and called "Larboard." Since it was easily confused with the word *Starboard*, and the left side faced the port, the term *Port* was adopted. Further, those loading supplies were called porters.

#### **How to Remember Port and Starboard Sides**

PORT has 4 letters and ends with the letter T, just like the word LEFT. The word STARBOARD has an R in it, just like RIGHT.
