President's Message

The Board did not meet this month so there is nothing to report with respect to actions taken. In the coming months we will be looking at the newly adopted reserve budget and considering requisite component repairs.

Outside of Board action, I can report that Santa Cruz County is in the process of considering amendments to its General Plan/Local Coastal Program regarding "coastal bluffs and beaches" that have a direct impact on Canon del Sol as well as other coastal development. These amendments are in the hands of the County Planning Department to be considered first by the Planning Commission and then the Board of Supervisors with input from the Coastal Commission. I will be addressing a separate letter with respect to this matter to you shortly.

Work on improving the median continues at a pace that probably seems slow to many. Removing the stumps was a chore that exceeded expectations but has finally been completed, along with the leveling of soil. The next step is the installation of a water line under and across Sand Dollar Drive, which will be undertaken with participation from the farmer on both sides of Sand Dollar as well as our neighboring HOA. This work is now underway.

A good time was had by those who attended the holiday party on December 8. The number in attendance exceeded those in attendance at previous functions, which added to the festivities. Thank you, Pat Vance and John Mello.

Happy Holidays to all. As we move into 2019 let's hope it is a good year for all of us here at Canon del Sol.

Coastal Rail Trail Groundbreaking Celebration Set for Jan. 10

The City of Santa Cruz and the Regional Transportation Commission are pleased to announce that the groundbreaking for the first segment of the Coastal Rail Trail—the San Lorenzo River Parkway Phase III/Trestle Trail Project—will take place on Thursday, Jan. 10, from 12:15 to 12:45 p.m. at the west base of the San Lorenzo River Railroad Trestle Bridge. The project, which comprises a portion of the Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail Network's Segment 8, will replace the existing 4-foot-wide walkway on the San Lorenzo River Railroad Trestle Bridge with a new multi-use trail that is 10-feet wide. The 32-mile long Coastal Rail Trail is a part of the Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Com-mission's Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail Network Master Plan.

The public is invited to celebrate — come rain or shine — with City and Santa Cruz County officials and community members who helped to bring this project to fruition over many years. The ground-breaking ceremony will be followed by a free-of-charge community party including speakers, refreshments, commemorative giveaways and Coastal Rail Trail engineering displays.

Attendees may park free of charge at the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk River Parking Lot. Free bicycle valet parking is hosted by Bike Santa Cruz County.

The Monterey Bay Sanctuary Scenic Trail Network is planned to be a braided bicycle/pedestrian network along Santa Cruz County's coast to provide alternative transportation and coastal access, and foster appreciation for the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary.

Recipe Corner

Toffee Walnuts

3 C. walnuts, shelled 2 T. Water ½ C. brown sugar 4 T. butter

½ C. granulated sugar 1 T. pure vanilla extract

- 1. Line a half sheet baking sheet with parchment. Set aside.
- 2. In a large saucepan, combine sugars, water and butter. Stir to combine.
- 3. Attach a candy thermometer.
- 4. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture comes to a boil. Add walnuts.
- 5. Stirring constantly, cook mixture until it reaches 285-290 degrees, being careful not to burn the mixture. Remove from heat, add vanilla extract and still well.
- 6. Quickly spread nuts on a lined baking sheet. While warm, use two forks to separate the nuts. Allow walnuts to cool until hardened. Store in an airtight container.

Rooftop Solar Experience at Canon del Sol?

After over a year I can report "Come on in, the sunlight is fine!"

In September 2017, my wife and I completed an install of Canon del Sol's first rooftop solar photovoltaic system. We accomplished this with the excellent cooperation of the Canon del Sol Board of Directors and a local solar installation company.

While I was confident that solar worked, I did wonder how well it would work given the different sunlight characteristics of our La Selva Beach area where there are more clouds on more days which will reduce solar production. The system has exceeded my expectations and in year one yielded an annual \$252 billing credit from PG&E, and a zero \$\$\$ bill for my entire 2018 electrical consumption. You may have noticed Canon del Sol has also been transitioned (if you didn't opt out) to Monterey Bay Community Power. I'm going to be very interested to see how my annual 2019 billing works out since MBCP reimburses for overproduction at a higher rate than PG&E.

Our 24-panel 7.68 kilowatt system is large by most residential standards, and oversized for a typical homeowner. Canon del Sol residents could easily benefit from a much smaller, and therefore more affordable, system. The system was sized in anticipation of future full-time occupancy; we also drive electric cars which greatly increases a home's electrical consumption once you start charging your car at home (but no longer have a gasoline bill).

For those considering a solar system, a review of your 12-month electrical bills will yield your annual consumption. Annual consumption of 6,000-8,000 kWh would not be outlandish nor abnormal for our area. My system's 2018 production was 11,680 kWh. If you calculate that on a per panel basis it is 486 kWh produced per solar panel per year. A modest 12-panel 3.84 kW system would cover most CDS owners' annual consumption.

Due to how solar is billed in California, you don't even need to cover your entire annual usage to end up with a **zero \$\$\$ bill at the end of the year**. How is that possible? PG&E residential Time of Use (TOU) rate plans "credit" you more for each kWh produced during the day, and charge you less for every kWh consumed at night. So even a very modest 6- to 8-panel solar system may be able to wipe out your annual electrical financial bill, even if it does not cover your annual kWh usage.

There are some details in "going solar," and I won't burden this article with all of the gory details. Any local solar contractor can easily explain and document the impact on your annual electrical bill. If you'd like to speak with me directly I'd love to say hello to my fellow residents and I'd be more than happy to share my solar experience.

If you do decide to proceed with solar, it will require you to sign and accept the Canon del Sol HOA solar accommodations. Please work with the board should you decide to proceed, and let your solar contractor know there will be some approvals required prior to the install beginning. Installation itself is typically quick and painless, with installs typically taking 2-3 days to complete once the contractor is onsite.

Some statistics for my system from 2018 are as follows:

2018 Annual Production

11,680 kWh Hours produced

(11.68 megawatt-hours)

2018 Maximum Production day

51.10 kWh on June 21, 2018 (summer solstice)

2018 Minimum Production day

2.63 kWh on January 8, 2018

(must've been very rainy with dark clouds)

2018 per-panel Average Production

11,680 kWh/24 panels =

468 kWh/year per-320 watt panel

2018 Average Daily Production

11,680/365 days = 32 kWh/day on average


